his year, the corporation known today as Fulton County Health Center marks its 80th anniversary of serving area communities. To celebrate 80 years of service to the area, we take a look back at the roots of the original Detwiler Hospital, the opening of FCHC, and the continual improvements at the Health Center to meet the changing healthcare needs of area residents.

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THE BEGINNING

It all began in 1929, when the First City Hospital of Wauseon was incorporated in preparation for its move to a new facility on Shoop Avenue. A few months later, in January 1930, the DeEtte Harrison Detwiler Memorial Hospital was officially dedicated and opened. Detwiler Hospital was built using a grant from A.K. Detwiler, the husband of DeEtte, and contributions from community members. Five thousand people toured the new hospital, which could accommodate 46 adults, six children, and 12 infants.

THE NEED FOR A NEW HOSPITAL

By the late 1960's, Detwiler Hospital was at peak capacity and the building was showing its age. Patients called for nurses using a hand-held bell, and although the medical equipment was adequate it certainly was not current. The facility had no air conditioning and oxygen was kept in portable tanks. An independent consultant performed a feasibility study and confirmed the need for a new hospital. Plans were drawn up for a 55-bed, three-story facility at a cost of \$5 million.

Funding

Fulton County was at the top of the federal government's list for a \$1.625 million Hill-Burton grant. But more was needed, and Wauseon dentist Dr. Harold E. Boucher spearheaded a bond issue campaign. Fulton County voters approved the levy and \$3.25 million was raised.

Building for the Future

A Cleveland architectural firm was retained and soon advised hospital officials to build a larger facility than originally planned. "The architects urged us to anticipate future growth in the county," says E. Dean Beck, FCHC Administrator who was the Business Manager at the time. "They felt the new hospital would not only serve the growing population, but it would also be a focal point to attracting new physicians and businesses to the area." Plans were redrawn for a five-story, 124-bed hospital at a cost of \$9 million. In addition to the Hill-Burton federal grant and the money raised from the bond levy, funding also came from \$3.1 million of hospital revenue bonds that were issued along with memorial contributions. Ground breaking was held in March 1971 on a 28-acre site on Shoop Avenue, across the street from Detwiler Hospital.



A PROGRESSIVE DESIGN

Construction of the new Fulton County Health Center featured modern architecture and state-of-the-art



features such as central air conditioning, radiant heating and a heating-cooling system along the perimeter of the ceiling. Unique mirrored windows were installed to prevent heat from entering during warm weather while allowing patients and visitors to clearly see through. Oxygen

was piped directly to patient rooms, eliminating the need for bedside oxygen equipment. Electric beds were installed replacing the old crank beds from Detwiler. All patient rooms were private, except for those in the Obstetrical Department, making FCHC the first hospital in the area to offer all private rooms. "The original Detwiler Hospital was not air conditioned," says Judy Cook, RN, a Coordinator/Educator in FCHC's Corporate and Community Health Promotions Department who spent a few years at the old facility. "It was a big deal to patients and staff to have centralized air conditioning in the new building."

OPEN FOR BUSINESS

On March 24, 1973 Fulton County Health Center was dedicated with many local and state officials in attendance. Tours were held on two consecutive Sundays and more than 10,000 area residents visited. On April 8, 1973 the new FCHC officially began operating when 42 patients were transferred in less than two hours from Detwiler Memorial Hospital to the new facility. The new Health Center had barely been open an hour when it suddenly saw its first patients. It was only minutes after the final patient was transferred, when Wauseon physician Dr. V.L. Cotterman delivered the first baby in the new facility. Soon after the Emergency Room had its first patient when an 11-year-old boy was X-rayed, treated and released after having been kicked by a pony. Dr. Cotterman was busy again when he admitted the first patient to the Coronary Care department.

CHANGING THROUGH THE YEARS

As the county grew and new medical technologies emerged, Fulton County Health Center changed to meet the growing heath needs of the area. "We knew our Health Center would eventually have to adapt to meet the needs of our community," says Administrator Beck, who has guided the Health Center since 1975 through many building projects. Since its opening in 1973, the Health Center has gone through four expansion projects along with adding a variety of new health care services.

TECHNOLOGY LEADS THE WAY

Over the past 80 years, there has been a dramatic change in medical technology. "The equipment we use in our facility today ... 30 years ago you wouldn't have dreamed it was possible to ever have such sophistication," says Beck. Over the last several years the Health Center has purchased state-of-the-art diagnostic imaging technology such as the in-house MRI Unit, Digital Mammography, 64-slice CT scanner, and equipment for the new Heart and Vascular Center. Advance surgical care is also being performed at the Health Center including reconstructive, laparoscopic, laser, and radio frequency procedures. All these advances are part of Fulton County Health Center's commitment to bringing quality health care close to home. Insight and planning is needed on the part of the Health Center's Board of Directors in order to be prudent in selecting the right technology. "Our Board is very supportive of our requests to consider and purchase new technology," adds Beck.

In addition to advances in medical technology, the Health Center is also nearly 100% complete in implementing electronic medical records that can be quickly accessed by members of the diagnostic and treatment team. "We're ahead of the curve compared to most community hospitals in the use of electronic medical records," says Beck. "We began the process nearly nine years ago, and some hospitals have just recently begun the process."

THE SURGE IN OUTPATIENT CARE

"Back in the days of Detwiler Hospital there was no such thing as outpatient treatment," says Administrator Beck. "If you were admitted to the hospital for gall bladder surgery, you typically stayed for 6-7 days. Today, a patient has their gallbladder removed laparoscopically as an outpatient, and they walk out of the hospital the same day." Through the years, outpatient services have grown at the Health Center. Some of the outpatient services offered today include Oncology, Mental Health Counseling, Cardiac Rehabilitation, Diabetes Education, and Outpatient Physical Therapy. Beck says 80% of the Health Center's business comes from outpatients.

EMERGENCY CARE ADVANCES

Many times the first exposure a patient has to Fulton County Health Center is through its Emergency Department. It is one area where the Health Center has grown tremendously. It is interesting to note that when the Health Center first opened, the Emergency Department was less than 2,000 square feet in size. In 1990, the Health Center doubled the size of the Emergency Department and added a trauma room. As patient volume increased, the Health Center began planning for a new Emergency Department. In 2007 a new 18,000 square foot facility was opened bringing advanced emergency care to the local area. "There's no comparison between the old and new department," says Unit Manager Bonnie Creager, RN. "We have more beds, more space and more privacy for patients, and we have one physician on staff at all times." Creager says the department has a specialized trauma area separate from the non-trauma area. It also has a Fast Track program to speed the care of non-life threatening emergencies. In addition, Fast Track is staffed by a physician from 6:00 p.m. to midnight, Monday through Friday, and 4:00 p.m. to midnight on weekends. FCHC currently treats 1100-1200 patients each month in its Emergency Department.

Obstetrical Department Grows

Obstetrics is another service that has changed through the years. Years ago there were no fathers or family members allowed in the delivery room, and natural childbirth did not become popular until 1973. Pharmaceutical drugs to mask the pain of childbirth were not made available until mid-1980. "Today's birthing process is so much more comfortable and homelike," says Connie Koppenhofer, RN, Obstetrics Unit Manager. "And it is typical to have several family members involved in the process."

Not only has the comfort of childbirth improved over the years, but so has the ability to deliver premature babies in an emergency situation. Koppenhofer says today's Fulton County Health Center is prepared to handle emergency premature deliveries by stabilizing the infant and then transferring the baby to a Toledo-area neonatal center for observation and care. "Not too long ago an infant would not have survived if it wasn't at least at 32 weeks," says Koppenhofer. "But with new fetal monitor and respiratory technology, we can save those babies. We've actually delivered one who was only 23 weeks old."

Security is a major issue in hospital OB departments, and FCHC takes it quite seriously. Security was recently upgraded with the HUGS security system. At birth, each baby receives an electronic tag that is matched to the mother and father. If the baby is moved anywhere near locked exit doors, the doors lock down. If the baby's

tag becomes loose or is cut off, alarms sound. When the baby is brought into the mother's room, the Brahm's lullaby chimes signaling that the baby and mother have been correctly matched to avoid mistakes. "It's a very patient-protective security system that is not obtrusive," says Koppenhofer. She says the department has changed over time to accommodate more mandates from the Ohio Department of Health requiring more tests, medications and documentation. In a typical year the FCHC Obstetrical department delivers 340-360 babies a year, nearly one a day. The Health Center is currently undergoing a significant renovation of its Obstetrical unit (see News & Notes).

THE ASSISTED LIVING & LONG-TERM CARE COMPONENT

After Fulton County Health Center opened in 1973, Detwiler Hospital was converted to a long-term care facility and renamed Detwiler Manor. For many years Detwiler Manor served area residents. But by mid-1990 the building was dated and needed work. FCHC's Administration and Board of Directors stepped in and began planning for the development of an assisted living and long-term care facility on its campus that would be adjacent to the Health Center. In 1996, Fulton Manor Nursing Home & Fulton Suites Assisted Living units were opened, and residents were transferred from Detwiler Manor to the new building. "Creating these facilities allowed us to better fulfill our mission of completing the circle of care for residents in our communities," says Beck.



"It was my ambition to see a hospital built, which closely resembled a home – cheerful, colorful, peaceful, and comfortable. I feel our patients will now find the transition from home to our new facility less traumatic."

PREVENTION & INTERVENTION

Health care has always been about diagnosing and treating patients. But years ago, prevention of disease and illness started to become popular, and FCHC was on the forefront of this movement with its Corporate and Community Health Promotions Department. "People are much more educated about their health today, and they are taking advantage of information on the Internet," says Cook, a member of the department. "We offer all kinds of health education classes, programs, seminars, and tests for them as well. And our physicians have really embraced the prevention aspect of health care."

PERSONAL CARE CONTINUES

Along with the many technological and facility changes at the Health Center, the one area that remains constant is the commitment to the personal care of the patient. "At Fulton County Health Center, we are committed to making your experience here as pleasant as possible," says Administrator Beck. "That personal care we provide sets us apart from many of the larger metropolitan hospitals."

THE FUTURE

Now that Fulton County Health Center has just finished its major expansion and renovation projects, what is next? "There are no concrete plans right now," says FCHC Administrator E. Dean Beck. "But I can assure the residents out there that we are constantly evaluating our services and seeking ways to improve through the addition of new technology, new physicians and trained staff members, or new construction projects. We're a vital part of this community, and we have to continue to stay ahead of the curve."

Expanding Services to Meet Patient Needs



Fchc Heart Vascular Center

The Heart and Vascular Center at FCHC continues to expand its level of services for area patients. Recently the Center replaced an existing pacemaker in a patient with an upgraded ICD pacemaker. The Heart and Vascular Center has also begun placing IVC filters in patients. The IVC filter traps blood clots in the large veins before the blood is returned to the heart. The procedure is performed in the lab under fluoroscopy, which provides a live, X-ray movielike image that helps guide the physician during the procedure. "Td like to thank Mr. Beck and the Health Center Board for their vision in growing these services in the Fulton County area," says Brad Moenter, RCIS. "Everything is done right here at the Health Center. It is very convenient for our patients and families to stay in town for this type of diagnostic and interventional procedure. Usually the same staff that performs the procedure also provides the pre/post patient care."

The Heart and Vascular Center also performs Balloon Kyphoplasty, a procedure that helps relieve back pain in patients with fractured vertebra as a result of osteoporosis. "Balloon Kyphoplasty allows us to use a balloon to inflate a recently fractured vertebra that has been compressed and causing the patient pain," says Moenter. "Once the vertebra has been restored to its original height with the balloon, the physician injects a type of cement for support, thereby eliminating the patient's back pain." Medicare Patients: Take Note

A popular misconception is that if you are admitted to a hospital for three or more days, Medicare would typically pay for the hospital stay as well as for follow-up care in a skilled nursing facility. But the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) have become much more stringent in enforcing their guidelines on medical necessity.

"First of all, Medicare coverage for admission to a hospital is based on the CMS determining if it was a medical necessity for that patient to be admitted," says Jeanie Schlueter, RN, FCHC Case Management Coordinator. "Then they look at the intensity of the health care services provided to the patient to determine if a three-day hospital stay was warranted. Finally, the CMS determines if the intensity of the services provided in the hospital warrant the patient being moved to a skilled nursing facility for follow-up care."

Schlueter says patients can no longer assume they can be admitted to a hospital for three-days and then be transferred to a skilled nursing facility. "Basically the CMS is saying they will not cover custodial care as a skilled nursing facility setting," says Schlueter. Custodial care can be described as providing basic every day care to an individual such as assisting with medications, food, and bathing. Medicare Billings Face Greater Scrutiny

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) has implemented a national program to identify incorrect Medicare payments. Hospitals, long-term care providers, physicians, home health agencies, durable medical equipment suppliers, and other providers or suppliers will be subject to scrutiny by one of four permanent Recovery Audit Contractors (RACs) situated around the country whose purpose is to guard the Medicare Trust Fund. The CMS goal is to make sure the Medicare program remains solvent for years to come.

In the Tax Relief and Health Care Act of 2006, Congress required a permanent and national RAC program to be in place by January 1, 2010. A test program was held between 2005 and 2008 in California. Florida. New York, Massachusetts, South Carolina, and Arizona. The test program found both overpayments and underpayments and adjustments were made. Overpayments can occur when health care providers submit claims that do not meet Medicare's coding or medical necessity policies. Underpayments can occur when health care providers submit claims for a simple procedure but the medical record reveals that a more complicated procedure was actually performed.

The FCHC Compliance department has been working to prepare for the additional scrutiny it will begin receiving in August 2009. Under the leadership of Joyce Wonders, CCS, FCHC Compliance Analyst, the Health Center is conducting internal reviews of its Medicare charts. "We will continue to provide excellent care to all of our patients," says Jan Yoder, RN, BSN, MAOM, the FCHC Compliance Officer. "We've always been diligent about our coding and billing for every patient at FCHC." Remodeling Update

When our new three-story addition was opened in 2007, 18,000 square feet of space was vacated by departments that moved into the new section. Since then renovation was done to expand and create customized work areas for those departments that did not move to the new section. Central Registration, Surgery, Radiology, and the Laboratory Departments were all renovated in phases. Many of the changes were done to make it more convenient for patients and to provide more privacy and speed to the admissions process. The latest department to be renovated is Obstetrics, where private showers are being installed in the Post-Partum rooms. The entire Obstetrics department will be painted and receive new wall covering. The renovation will give the department a fresh new look. It is scheduled to be completed this spring.

3. Exercise to music! What kind? Whatever makes you get up on your feet!


4. Exercise with a friend. Group exercise can help you work out regularly and get better results (See FCHC Fitness Classes in this newsletter).

Patients at Fulton County Health Center can now say they're receiving the "royal treatment" when they stay overnight at the Health Center. FCHC's new Room Service Dining program, introduced on February 17th, allows patients to select their own menus for breakfast, lunch and dinner. "It's a patientfocused program that allows individuals to have input on the food they eat while staying at the Health Center," says Paul Rosenbeck, FCHC Director of Food & Nutrition Services. "In the short time it has been in effect, patients have given us very positive comments."

The Room Service program replaces the Health Center's traditional system where a menu of food items was rotated on a 21-day basis. The patient had little or no opportunity to request specific foods. "Our Room Service program changes all of that," says Rosenbeck. "We offer personally selected and individually prepared meals from a menu that patients are given." Room service dining is available 7:00 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. by calling the Health Center phone number 3663 (FOOD). Food orders are verified to make sure

they comply with the dietary instructions of the attending physician. "We want to make sure patients eat what they prefer as long as it doesn't interfere with their doctor's orders," says Rosenbeck. "For example if a cardiac patient orders a cheeseburger, our dietitians will explain why that is not a good idea and will



offer alternative menu suggestions."

SERVICE

The Room Service Dining menu includes breakfast items as well as hot lunch and dinner entrees including oven-roasted turkey, beef pot roast with gravy, baked chicken breast, lemon baked tilapia, and spaghetti with marinara or meat sauce. Pizza, deli sandwiches, and grill selections are available with a variety of salads and side orders. Many of the menu items are heart healthy entrees.
