

Fulton County Health Center Since 1983, Fulton County Health Center has been providing cancer care treatment for area residents. Originally known as the Rainbow Oncology/ Hematology Treatment Center, the program was renamed in 2021 as FCHC Cancer Care as part of an overall rebranding strategy of many of our outpatient services. FCHC Cancer Care consists of two cancer services. The first service - known as FCHC Cancer Care: Oncology, Hematology and Infusion - is a hospital based outpatient service for oncology/hematology patients who need ongoing nursing care and in many cases infusion treatment for cancer. The second component is the FCHC Cancer Care Oncology Hematology Clinic, which is a part of FCHC Medical Group that provides clinic follow-up with physicians and advanced practice professionals.

For many years, patients in our community who have been diagnosed with cancer have relied on treatment at Fulton County Health Center. Beginning in January 2023, FCHC Cancer Care will be able to offer expanded clinic hours for area patients that will allow oncology and hematology patients to see their oncologist, hematologist or advanced practice professional in a timelier manner due to increased provider coverage. The expanded coverage will be available three days a week.

"If you have a cancer diagnosis, you want to see your oncologist or hematologist as soon as possible so you can begin your treatment," says Leisa Britsch, RN, BSN, OCN, FCHC Cancer Care and Hematology Director. "This increased coverage by our providers will greatly benefit patients."

Three physicians and a nurse practitioner will rotate to see patients three days a week at FCHC Cancer Care:

- Melinda Campbell, CNP provides Advanced Practice Oncology coverage

Rex Mowat, MD, Ahmad Zazour, MD, and Melinda Campbell, CNP have been seeing patients at FCHC Cancer Care throughout 2022. Dr. Chawla is new to the FCHC Cancer Care staff.

All four providers provide not only oncology care, but they also see hematology patients for benign blood disorders.

A LOOK AT THE STAFF

In addition to the four providers mentioned here, FCHC Cancer Care has a nursing staff of eight members with a combined 125 years of service. "Our nurses are all Registered Nurses who have taken the ONS Chemotherapy/Biotherapy Provider Course," says Britsch. "They are not only well-trained, but they have a wealth of experience in treating and caring for cancer patients."

FCHC Cancer Care nurses also offer a close nurse/patient relationship. Patients and the community also benefit from educational and informational programs. If patients experience any issues or family concerns, they can contact a nurse in the department who is on call after hours, on weekends, as well as holidays. Discharge planning is also provided, which is an ongoing process between the patient, family, nurse, and any other help that may be needed in the home setting.

OUR TREATMENT FACILITY


As you enter the main hospital lobby, FCHC Cancer Care is located on the 1st floor directly to your left. We also have a separate entrance for oncology patients just to the left of the main entrance as you are arriving. This separate entrance allows oncology patients to come directly to the Cancer Center and avoid going through the lobby area at the main entrance.

Our treatment facility offers a wide variety of special features that include:

- La-Z-Boy[®] type chairs with an individual stereo system and TV for each chair
- Private treatment room with a bed (for those who cannot sit in the chairs)
- An easy access, private entrance
- Larger, wheelchair accessible bathrooms
- Private interview rooms to discuss patient problems
- Snack area for patients
- Large, private waiting room for patients and family

THE DIAGNOSTIC PROCESS

"It's not unusual for a person to worry they might have cancer based on symptoms they have," says Britsch. "The first thing they should do is contact their primary care provider and schedule a visit for a diagnosis. The diagnosis could consist of blood work, scans, and a discussion with the provider about the type, length and level of pain associated with the symptoms. The primary care provider will then make a diagnosis and refer the patient to one of our FCHC Cancer Care providers."

SHARING RESOURCES

The FCHC Cancer Care program has partnered with The Cancer Care Alliance, a regional group of hospitals that share data and metrics on the types of cancer cases in the region and the care provided. The alliance is associated with Karmanos Cancer Center, a well-respected Detroit-based cancer facility. The alliance includes FCHC Cancer Care as well as Oncology departments from the University of Toledo Medical Center, The Toledo Clinic, Henry County Hospital, and Wood County Hospital.

"The alliance is still in the planning stages," says Britsch.

"But the goal is to be able to share research results, provider specialists, and patient support. This will remove any guesswork in directing patients to a specific specialist in the region for the best care. It's all about working as a larger team for the improved care and treatment of patients." (*Continued on page 4.*)

Britsch points out that cancer care in the United States is standardized, and patients don't need to go to a large university-based hospital for treatment. "The only thing they can offer that we don't are research studies. So, the creation of the alliance will benefit all of us."

IMPROVED DETECTION & TREATMENT

When most people think of cancer treatment, they probably think it involves chemotherapy. But cancer care has continued to advance, and now an increasing percentage of certain cancers are being treated by oral medications (pills) instead of IVs.

Not only is treatment advancing, but earlier detection of cancers is higher than in past years. "I think a large part of the reason for all the early detections is that primary care providers are promoting routine health screenings to their patients, and the patients are listening and getting the screenings," says Britsch. "Our generation and the younger generation are more into their health than our parents were."

A MULTI-DISCIPLINARY TREATMENT PLAN

When a patient is coming for treatment at FCHC Cancer Care, providers and staff meet once a month to review new patient medical records and discuss the best course of treatment for them. In addition, they also review the treatment already being provided to current patients. "Communication between all of us is important to make sure we provide the absolute best care we can provide," says Britsch.

SUPPORT SERVICES

In addition to treating patients, FCHC Cancer Care also offers a wide variety of support services to patients, families, and the community. We offer educational materials and programs, as well as other services to help patients and families cope with the diagnosis and stress of their disease.

Counseling Services – We provide counseling for nutrition, emotional and coping concerns, as well as end of treatment concerns.

Lymphedema Clinic – Located in the FCHC Rehabilitation Center at 719 South Shoop Avenue in Wauseon, the clinic includes specialists from physical therapy who are trained to treat patients with lymphedema.

Prosthesis & Wig Bank – Available for patients who cannot afford to purchase their own.

A COMMITMENT TO CARING

More than 1300 people from all over Northwest Ohio and Southern Michigan receive state of the art cancer and hematology care at FCHC Cancer Care. Our program offers chemotherapy, palliation therapy, blood product transfusion therapy, and infusion therapy for various conditions. We also offer a hematology/oncology clinic. Many services are also provided to support patients and families who are diagnosed with cancer or a hematological condition.

From a Volunteen to a Physician Assistant

How do you find your passion in life? For Amy Miller White, a Physician Assistant at FCHC Urgent Care, it all began with inspiration from her mother, a Registered Nurse who has worked at FCHC for more than 30 years, and an opportunity to volunteer at the Health Center.

"When I was an undergraduate studying Biology at Bowling Green State University, I had an opportunity to participate in the Volunteen program here," says White. She served as a volunteer for several years, and along the way she met and talked with many staff members while learning the inner workings of a hospital.

"I had always had an interest in the medical field because

of my mom," says White. "The Volunteen program helped me realize how important it was to serve my community in Fulton County. I'm now able to do that in my career as a Physician Assistant."

As a Volunteen, White staffed the main information desk in the hospital lobby. She also worked at hospital events, registered clients for farm screenings, and transported people from outpatient surgery to their cars. "When I participated, the Volunteen program was not very large," says White. "So, I worked with Mary Gautz, our Volunteer Coordinator to try and promote it more to high school students. Since then, the program has grown significantly."

After graduating with a Biology degree from BGSU, White attended the University of Findlay where she earned her Master's degree as a Physician Assistant. She was credentialed in 2019 and worked as a Physician Assistant at an Urgent Care facility in Wauseon, which has since closed. She then moved on to work at a gastroenterology office. This past May, she was hired as a Physician Assistant at FCHC Urgent Care.

When asked why she became a Physician Assistant, White responds ... "It's an opportunity for me to work as a medical provider and have the opportunity to see patients for longer visits. Spending more time with them allows me to relate better to them and connect on a deeper level."

As a Physician Assistant at FCHC Urgent Care, White works a rotating shift covering Friday-Sunday followed by Tuesday-Thursday. She is able to prescribe medications and treat patients for injuries including fractures, cuts, and abrasions. FCHC Urgent Care is even able to take X-rays and get results in real time. "The best way to describe what we do is that you would go to Urgent Care if you were not able to connect with your primary care provider," she says. "You'll be able to get in and out faster than in an Emergency Department, and our billing procedure is similar to what you would expect from a doctor's office. But if you are having serious issues, like chest pain, you should go immediately to an Emergency Department."

Looking back, White says she was fortunate to participate in the FCHC Volunteen program and find a career she is passionate about. "I've never once been disappointed in my job, even on the most hectic of days," says White. "And I love being back here where I grew up, seeing familiar faces and caring for members of my community."

Are We Headed for a Tripledemic?

COVID-19 isn't the only viral threat facing the U.S. this coming winter. The seasonal influenza (flu) is upon us, and as of mid-December, influenza is outpacing COVID and RSV (respiratory syncytial virus) in our area. The rise of a single respiratory infection is cause for concern, but when two or three viruses start circulating in the community it is a unique situation to deal with and has the potential to overload the health care system.

What's Behind the Concern?

In the past two years, respiratory disease activity has been dominated by COVID-19, and seasonal circulation of other respiratory viruses have been historically low. This is most likely the result of people taking steps to protect themselves against COVID. Now that most of these protective measures are no longer in place, we're seeing an increased spread of respiratory viruses while COVID-19 continues to generate new cases.

Who Is at Risk?

Anyone can get RSV, and for some it can cause cold-like symptoms, while for others it could lead to serious conditions such as pneumonia. "RSV, like flu, is more likely to be serious in younger children and older adults," says Barb Crow, BSN, RN, FCHC Infection Prevention & Employee Health Director. Individuals with underlying medical conditions such as asthma, chronic heart and lung disease, or a weak immune system may also be at increased risk for severe complications from RSV. "It's possible that some individuals could become ill with two respiratory viruses at the same time. It can be a combination of flu and RSV, or a combination of RSV and another common virus circulating in our community."

Is **RSV** New?

"RSV is not new," says Crow. "It's a respiratory virus that usually circulates every fall and winter. This year we're seeing a high volume of cases in all age groups, but particularly in young children."

Many respiratory viruses have similar symptoms. Warning signs that indicate children need immediate medical care include fast or difficulty breathing, bluish lips, chest pain, high fever, and lethargy.

Protect Yourself & Those Around You

"There are a variety of actions you can take to protect yourself and others," says Crow. "Wash your hands often; avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands; clean and disinfect surfaces that people frequently touch; avoid sharing cups and eating utensils with others; stay at home if you're not feeling well; cover your coughs and sneezes with tissues; or wear a well-fitting mask if you need to be around others." Unfortunately, there's no vaccine to protect against RSV yet, but scientists are working hard to develop one. CDC recommends vaccination against influenza and COVID-19 to all eligible people aged 6 months and older to avoid serious illness and a burden on hospitals.

Contact Your Provider

"If you are experiencing symptoms of respiratory illness, we recommend that you contact your health care provider and seek early treatment," says Crow.

Bauer Receives Award

Karen L. Bauer, DNP, A.P.R.N.-F.N.P., CWS, DAPWCA, Program Director for the FCHC Wound and Hyperbaric Center, has received the 2022 Distinguished Member Award from the Association for the Advancement of Wound Care (AAWC). Bauer has been on the AAWC's Board of Directors for the past six years and currently serves as the nurse board representative. She chairs the AAWC Educational Steering Committee, which arranges the majority of the educational content from the organization. Her committee is also heavily involved in the planning of the national conference.

Bauer's award stemmed from the AAWC being chosen as a participating organization in the American Heart Association's Peripheral Artery Disease National Action Plan. The plan is a national initiative to increase awareness and education regarding peripheral artery disease. Bauer's participation as the AAWC liaison subsequently led to her becoming a member of the American Heart Association PAD National Action Plan Steering Committee. The committee is tasked with engaging patients and clinicians in recognition and educational endeavors regarding peripheral artery disease.



Financial Assistance Policy – Plain Language Summary

The Fulton County Health Center financial assistance policy exists to provide eligible patients partially or fully discounted emergency or medically necessary medical care. Patients seeking financial assistance must complete an application for financial assistance, which is summarized below.

Eligible Patients/Services

The following is a brief description of eligible patients and services. Eligible services will include all emergency and medically necessary services provided by the Fulton County Health Center. Eligible patients include all patients who submit a financial assistance application who are determined to be eligible for financial assistance.



How to Apply

In addition, if you provide your mailing address to a Financial Counselor, we will mail you a copy of our Financial Assistance Policy and Application Form free of charge.

Determination of Eligibility

Patients are eligible for financial assistance through the Fulton County Health Center based on their income level and family size as it relates to the Federal Poverty Levels. Patients with family income of 400% or less than the Federal Poverty level, based on family size, may be eligible for discounts up to 100% of the cost of their eligible services. Eligible patients will not be charged more for emergency or other medically necessary services than Amounts Generally Billed (AGB) than those patients that have Medicare or another private insurance.

Availability of Financial Assistance Policy

Copies of the Financial Assistance Policy is available at all locations listed above free of charge. Also, Spanish versions of the Financial Assistance application and policy are also available.

New Kiosks Help Speed Registration

Sometime in the early part of 2023, new technology will become operational that will help speed the registration process for FCHC

patients. That's when two, new stand-alone kiosks will become operational in the patient waiting area of Central Registration. The two kiosks are currently being tested by staff members to make sure they function smoothly and correctly. "These kiosks will be available to patients requiring some type of radiology scan or service and for our respiratory patients," says Amanda Unverferth, FCHC Patient Access Coordinator. "In order to be able to use one of the kiosks, the

patient must be

pre-registered before they arrive at the Health Center. If they are pre-registered, they can arrive at the hospital and skip going to the Central Registration window. Instead, they will be able to sign in at the kiosk in the patient waiting area."

Once a patient has completed filling in the information on the kiosk screen, the Radiology or Respiratory department will receive a popup message telling them a patient is in the waiting area.

"We'll have a member of our Central Registration department standing by the kiosks if a patient needs assistance in using the new technology," says Unverferth. "Once a patient has used the kiosk, they should be comfortable doing it again in the future. But our staff members will always be available to assist as needed. If a patient is not comfortable using the kiosk, they are still welcome to talk to one of our registration clerks."

Unverferth says that in addition to testing the new technology, the Central Registration managers will meet with the Radiology and Respiratory Therapy departments to explain the kiosk system so all are on the same page. "We're excited about going live with this new technology," says Unverferth. "It will help our patients save time when they visit so they can get on with their daily activities afterwards."

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Fulton County Health Center has contracted with a new patient satisfaction survey vendor to improve the collection of information and to survey more patients. The new vendor, Press Ganey, has replaced the hospital's previous surveyor, National Research Corporation (NRC).

"The surveys are designed to provide us with a representation of the patient's experience throughout their episode of care with us," says Andrea Faykosh, RN, FCHC Director of Quality Improvement and Patient Safety, Medical Staff Services. "Survey guestions may address the quality of care provided by nurses and doctors, the cleanliness of the

environment, the ease of scheduling appointments, or even the quality of meals."

Patient satisfaction surveys will include paper surveys delivered via traditional mail as well as e-surveys that are sent via text message and email invitations. "When we switched over to using the Press Ganey system, we added additional service

lines to the process," says Faykosh. "This has increased the number of patients who will now receive surveys." All hospital inpatients will receive a paper survey via traditional mail for each hospital discharge. Outpatient surveys will be distributed to patients by either traditional mail or e-survey via a text message and follow-up email invitations. FCHC Medical Group patients will receive only e-surveys.

"We use this information to determine what areas of our organization are performing well so we can continue to provide excellent service to our patients," says Faykosh. "The survey results also help us to identify the changes that can be implemented to make our patients' care experience even better."
